Coach's Report

The summer months always bring an opportunity to reflect on the previous year as well as to refresh and prepare for the year ahead. We hope that the coming season will bring normalcy back to much of what we do, with a return to in-person classes, regular training, and the college social interactions that help to shape the experience for our student-athletes. But, as challenging as the last 16 months have been, there are lessons to learn that will make us better and faster in the years to come.

First and foremost, I have so much gratitude for our administration who worked tirelessly to make it possible for the team to train and race this past spring. It wasn't perfect, and we had some challenges that our competition didn't, but we were given the opportunity to train and compete to win during a year when we weren't sure if a spring season would be possible. The amount of work, creativity, and persistence to fight through the hurdles and uncertainty has been inspiring, so a huge thank you to Jim Knowlton and Jenny Simon-O'Neil for leading us through it. Those same life lessons of hard work, grit, and persistence are what we teach our team every day and it was heartening to see everyone in our athletic department setting that example from the top in difficult times.

Due to Covid-19 shutdowns and priority being given to winter sports, we were not able to train together as a team in the fall semester. Classes were all online and, while a group of 15-20 student-athletes were on campus, no organized training could be directed by the coaches. As a result, our group was spread out all over the world, training at their local clubs or respective national teams. Without the ability to mandate or organize training, it truly left the onus on the individuals to get the work in; I think we managed that paradigm shift reasonably well, but it also highlighted the value of consistent training and the competitive pressure that the team training environment provides.

We were able to bring the majority of the team back together in January and into a restricted training routine. Both student life and training were limited to housing cohorts, and training times were staggered to avoid any overlap amongst the groups at the boathouse or on the dock. Expectations were clearly set early in the semester regarding the need to stick to athletic department and team protocols during training and life outside of the boathouse. Our ability to race in the spring hung in the balance and was threatened a few times in February and March as we continually dealt with the challenges of training during a pandemic.

It was an emotional moment when we began our spring racing season against UC San Diego on our original racecourse on the Oakland Estuary. Feeling the history of the hundreds of Cal

Crews that raced past the Coast Guard Cutters and under the Park Street bridge while also acknowledging everything that it took to get to that moment of hearing “Attention... GO!” was truly special. It was a great moment for everyone involved and started our crews off with a positive first race. We went on to have successful races against Oregon State, Santa Clara, and Stanford before embarking on our first trip of the year up to Seattle to race Washington. All crews raced well, and the Third Varsity was able to walk away in the second 1000m to win, but we left Seattle know-

ing that we had work to do. Given our late start to training, we knew that the spring season would be a learning process and that we would hopefully be able to pick up speed as the crews got more time to train together in lineups.

After similar results at the Pac12 Championships, we arrived at the IRA Championships ready to test our speed against crews from all over the country. Similar gratitude is owed to Gary Caldwell, Katie Boldvich, and everyone at the IRA for pushing through a difficult year and holding a great national championship regatta. With a different format this year to accommodate a record 31 entries, the regatta started with time trials in all the events to seed the semi-finals taking place later that afternoon. All our crews advanced through the time trial and won their semi-finals to earn their spot in the final; we were one of only three programs that had crews in all A-finals (V8+, JV8+, 3V8+, V4+).

While winning is always our goal, our crews raced very well and we finished 2nd in the V8+ and 2nd overall as a team. We were one of two programs to have all boats in the medals with three silvers and one bronze. I am proud of how we navigated all our challenges this year, continued to push forward undeterred, and improved throughout the season.

Our focus on academic success continues to show progress as well. The team had another impressive year, finishing with a 3.53 GPA, which brings our cumulative GPA to a record high of 3.45. The Newmark Award winner for 2020/2021 won't be announced until the fall but we are in a good position to win the award for highest GPA for a large men's team at Cal for the fourth year in a row. Also highlighting our academic success, we had a record 27 student-athletes named to the Pac12 All-Academic team and 12 named as IRA Scholar Athletes. George

Other awards to note are Frederik Breuer winning the Pac12 Newcomer of the Year and Brett Cataldo winning the IRA Coxswain of the Year. Jack Robertson (Oscar Geballe award) and George Finlayson (Pac12 award) also won post-graduate scholarship awards which they will use next year at Oxford University and Cambridge University, respectively.

I am excited about the depth of the squad this year. Sam Baum and Brandon Shald have continued to do an outstanding job with recruiting young oarsmen

who want to pursue excellence on the water and in the classroom. We will have a larger team this year and will continue to build our team culture around the core tenets of being passionate about rowing, being good teammates, and bringing an infectious positive energy to everything that we do. Sam and Brandon lead that energy on a daily basis, and I am incredibly lucky to have them as my assistant coaches.

We had a great start to summer racing with three student-athletes racing at the Under-23 World Championships and all winning bronze medals - rising senior Olav Molenaar (Netherlands 4X) as well as incoming freshmen Iwan Hadfield (Great Britain 4-) and Tim Roth (Switzerland 2X). The Tokyo Olympics are only days away as I write this, and we will have a record nine athletes representing their respective countries. This is a great statement for the program that these young men are able to pursue IRA championships and world-class degrees while also preparing to make the difficult step up to their national teams and racing at the Olympics!

I am extremely grateful to everyone that supports our program. The Friends of Cal Crew, led by Steve Dettlinger, along with the Rogers family and all our program donors make it possible for this generation of Cal oarsmen to get the same formative experience that has impacted so many young men over the years. Thank you to everyone that supports the program and allows this generation to write their chapter in the history of Cal Crew.

Varsity 8+

The Cal Varsity 8+ opened its season with a commanding victory against the Cal JV and the UCSD Varsity 8+ on the Oakland Estuary. This was the first official Cal race on the Estuary in 25 years. The following weekend, the Varsity beat Santa Clara, Oregon State, and Stanford. The Bears looked to carry their positive momentum into the Cal/Washington Dual, but Washington was better on the day, steadily increasing its margin from the 500-meter mark to the finish line, ultimately winning by about a boat length. Such was also the case at Pac12s, where the Bears finished second to Washington by a similar margin. At the IRA, the Cal Varsity was fourth in the time trial, then recorded the fastest time of any crew in the semifinals. In the final, the Bears dueled with Dartmouth just behind Washington, and in the end finished with a silver medal behind the Huskies and ahead of the Big Green.

Junior Varsity 8+

In its first race of the season, the Cal Junior Varsity 8+ finished ten seconds behind the Cal Varsity 8+ and ten seconds ahead of the UCSD Varsity 8+ on the Oakland Estuary. Seven days later, the JV boat followed in the Varsity 8+'s footsteps by sweeping their dual races against Santa Clara, Oregon State, and Stanford. After a promising start to the season, the JV was outgunned by Washington in the Cal/Washington dual. In similar fashion, at Pac12s the Bears were unable to close the gap on Washington following a strong Washington start and earned themselves a silver medal. At the IRAs, the Bears won their time trial and their semifinal before facing stiff competition from Washington and Dartmouth in the final. Washington jumped out to an early lead and left the Cal JV and Dartmouth to battle for the silver and bronze. The Big Green just managed to squeeze out a couple of seats in the final 500 meters, with the Bears claiming the bronze medal.

Third Varsity 8+

Despite being a crew that fell victim to having a shortened regular season, the Bears Third Varsity 8+ made the most of their time on the racecourse. At the Cal/Washington dual, the Bears had a resounding victory over their archrivals. After a fairly level start, the Cal 3V began to pull away just after the 500-meter mark and never looked back, beating the Huskies by six seconds. Unfortunately for the 3V, Washington learned from their mistakes at the Dual and reversed the result at Pac12s, winning the final by less than a boat length. Coming into the IRA, the Bears and the Huskies were favored to finish in the top 2 spots, and ultimately the two crews lived up to the predictions and had another close race down the course. At the finish line, the Huskies were triumphant by 2.8 seconds- a result nearly identical to that at Pac12s.

Varsity 4+

At the Cal/Washington Dual, Cal fielded a Fourth Varsity 8 to compete against the Huskies. The Bears, many of whom were donning the “Big C” for the first time, had a strong race but were bested on the day by the Huskies. The UW Dual was the only race in which a Fourth Varsity 8+ raced. At Pac12s, the Washington V4+ was able to pull away in the second 1,000 meters and ended up beating the Bears by about a length of open water. As selection for the IRA concluded, the lineup for the V4+ included three freshmen and two seniors, four of whom were getting their first taste of racing at the IRA. In the final, Cal was locked with Boston University behind Washington for the full 2,000 meters. At the line, the Bears got the surge and finished 0.2 seconds ahead of BU, earning themselves a silver medal behind Washington.

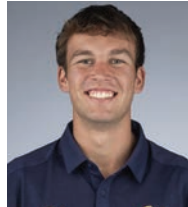

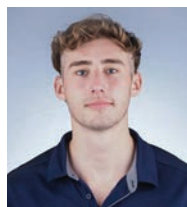

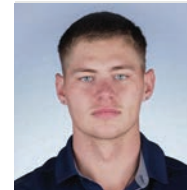

Racing's Return to the Estuary

As many of you know, the Bears have called the sheltered course at Redwood Shores in Redwood City home since the 1997 season due to heavy boat traffic and varying, unpredictable conditions on the Oakland Estuary. The COVID-19 pandemic required creativity and ingenuity from rowing programs and coaches around the country to make any early-spring racing happen. So, thanks to the coaches from Cal and UCSD, Cal Crew held a home race out of the T. Gary Rogers Rowing Center on the Estuary for the first time since the Big Row vs Stanford in May 1996. Thanks to some creative plan-

ning, the Bears and Tritons were able to get good race experience under their belts in a fun and different atmosphere. In their first race back in Oakland, the Bears Varsity 8+ and Junior Varsity 8+ both knocked off the Tritons' Varsity 8+, with times of 5:45, 5:55, and 6:05, respectively. Though the Estuary will not be used as Cal's home racecourse in the foreseeable future, it served its purpose brilliantly for early-spring racing during trying times. Thank you to all Cal Coaches and to former Cal Coach Geoff Bond (now head coach at UCSD) for making this exciting throwback style race happen!

Fundraising Report

The closure of the 2020-2021 academic calendar, spring racing season, and fiscal year, perhaps now more than ever, provides families with the opportunity to take a step back and take a breath. This past school year and rowing season were steeped in uncertainty, unpredictability, and spells of deep frustration, but under the guidance of the team's elite administrators and coaches, both were able to evolve into memorable experiences.

At the beginning of the fall semester, Cal Crew student-athletes were spread across the globe and attending their classes online. Balancing coursework at obscure hours while working to stay fit posed both mental and physical challenges for a collection of athletes, many of whom were unable to leave their homes at all. Regardless, when the time came to return to their teammates and classes in Berkeley, these resilient student-athletes were ready to put their best foot forward.

Thank you to our neighbors on the Estuary for allowing some of our athletes to train in singles and pairs out of your boathouses in the fall. Having small boat accommodations allowed the Cal athletes to have training partners and compete in fun scrimmages throughout the fall. After months of training in small boats and on ergs, the Bears were able to have a meaningful, albeit shortened, regular racing season. An up-and-down season that included sweeps of UCSD, Santa Clara, Oregon State, and Stanford, saw the Bears put down their best team performance at an IRA since they captured the team points title in 2016. What was originally a season in doubt blossomed into one of much success.

Critically, the dedication and ability to challenge adversity head-on demonstrated by the student-athletes and coaches was mirrored by the Friends of Cal Crew donors. Despite another year of not being able to hold key Friends of Cal Crew fundraising events such as the Alumni Day Auction, Parent Dinners, and the homecoming weekend tailgate, the 2021 fiscal year was one characterized by significant accomplishments. Thanks to generosity from donors like you, we raised over \$400,000 from over 870 gifts. The money raised from these donations was enough to cover our program financially for another season. The continuity of our program relies heavily on the support of our alumni, family, and friends. Each year the

Friends of Cal Crew is charged with filling a substantial budget gap and we depend upon the philanthropic leadership of our community to meet this challenge. With help from a generous one-to-one match from one of our donors, the Friends of Cal Crew aim to raise \$800,000-\$900,000 of the team's \$1.3 million operating budget. This target can be reached if our community strives for 100% engagement.

Those who at one time or another rowed on the Cal Crew continued to show how much Cal Crew means to them by accounting for two thirds of the total number of donations made this fiscal year. Despite all corners of the world being affected by the troubling times of the past 16 months, the Cal Crew and its supporters distinguished themselves as a selfless, resilient family of Bears eager to continue helping the team when it needed help most. Both the Bear crews and the Friends of Cal Crew are looking forward to bringing this positive momentum into the 2021-2022 season, academic calendar, and fiscal year.

In any standard year, the Friends of Cal Crew host a series of events aimed at bringing our Cal community together to celebrate the current batch of athletes and crews of the past. Traditionally, these events have been a great way for parents and alums to get acquainted with one another, talk with the coaches and athletes in an informal and off-campus setting, and for the Friends to raise awareness in person around upcoming campaigns. However, the global crisis caused by the COVID-19 pandemic led to the disappointing, though entirely necessary, halt of all traditional festivities.

In normal times, parents of freshman oarsmen would be greeted on move-in weekend by the coaches and the Friends of Cal Crew President and staff on campus in Berkeley. In early October, parents and alums are usually invited to the Cal

Crew tailgate at homecoming weekend, followed by a parent dinner at the 67 Canyon house. A true sign of spring racing to come is the Alumni Day gathering at the boathouse followed by the Cal Crew Auction. The Friends of Cal Crew are already looking forward to getting these exciting gatherings back on the calendar for the upcoming year.

Despite many traditional gatherings being canceled last year, there was some sense of normalcy with the continuation of numerous Cal Crew calendar staples. Thanks to the gung-ho nature of the Cal Athletic Department, the eagerness of the Cal student-athletes and coaches to do good in the community, and the flexibility of partnering organizations, the Cal team was able to branch out into Berkeley and Oakland to lend their hands to those in need on Giving Tuesday. On December 1st, our student-athletes worked at Acta Non Verba Farm in Oakland, the Alameda County Food Bank, and at Lake Merritt as clean-up volunteers. Reaching out to neighboring communities and offering our services is one way

Cal Crew dedicates itself to causes bigger than the team alone and to going out in the community and doing good. Giving Tuesday was also a success on the financial side of the team. Thanks to over 175 generous gifts from donors like you, the Friends of Cal Crew were able to raise \$41,000 from Giving Tuesday alone.

Similarly, the 24-hour fundraiser-a-thon known as the Big Give took place as scheduled. In years past, the Big Give campaign has been one of the largest sources of donations for Cal Crew, and this year was no different. As a result of this year's Big Give, the Friends of Cal Crew received over 180 donations totaling nearly \$50,000! This is a testament to the nature of Cal Crew donors and their heightened desire to give back to

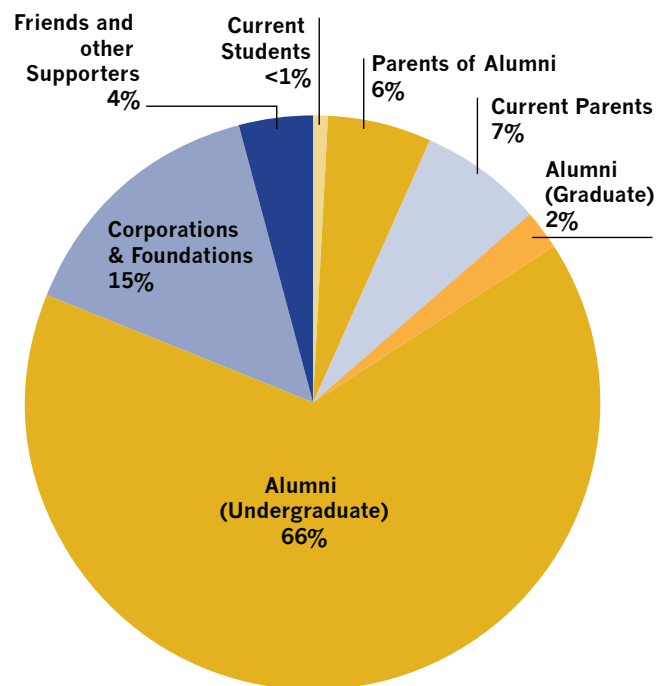
